
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To baste, thread a needle with a single strand of thread and knot the end. Insert the needle into the fabric at the edge of the seam allowance, and then bring it up through the fabric about 1/2 inch away. Take another stitch 1/2 inch away, and continue stitching in this manner until the entire seam allowance has been basted.



Running Stitches

Running stitches are the most basic type of hand sewing stitch. Running stitches are used to sew seams, attach appliqués, and embroider designs.

To sew a running stitch, thread a needle with a single strand of thread and knot the end. Insert the needle into the fabric at the edge of the seam allowance, and then bring it up through the fabric about 1/4 inch away. Patch Sewing

Ripped Hems

Ripped hems are a popular way to add a casual touch to a garment. To rip a hem, simply cut the fabric along the edge of the hem, being careful not to cut through the seam allowance. Once the hem is ripped, you can use a needle and thread to sew it back in place.

To sew a ripped hem, thread a needle with a single strand of thread and knot the end. Insert the needle into the fabric at the edge of the hem, and then bring it up through the fabric about 1/4 inch away. Take another stitch

1/4 inch away, and continue stitching in this manner until the entire hem has been sewn in place.



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

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
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
