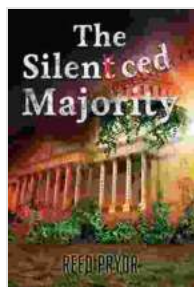


The Silenced Majority: Dennis Dickerson's Untold Story

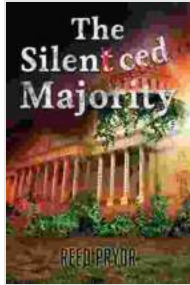
